

MUSIC NOTES

The *Missa Brevis in D*, K. 194 by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (1756-1791) was written in the Summer of 1774 for Archbishop Colloredo of Salzburg. Colloredo was a reformist churchman who took rather an austere view of music within the liturgy, and the *Missa Brevis in D* is evidence of Mozart's attempts to satisfy the Archbishop's strictures. By the standards of the period, it is a remarkably concise and simple work, scored only for two violins and bass. The influence of Haydn's St. Nicholas Mass (composed two years previously) can be heard in many sections of the *Missa Brevis*, not least in the beautiful Benedictus for solo quartet.

Theology Class. Today, at 10 a.m., on the fifth floor of the Parish House, Fr.
