

Nursery: We welcome our youngest members and guests to Saint Thomas Church. Nursery care is available for infants and young children of parents attending the 9 and 11 a.m. liturgies. If your child would like to attend the nursery, please ask one of our ushers or staff who will kindly direct you. Once at the nursery, parents will be asked to sign their children in and will receive a silent pager for use during the service.

Sunday School. Children who are in pre-school through 6th grade are invited to attend Sunday School classes at Saint Thomas Church. Class usually meets on Sundays at 11 a.m., and the children are brought down to church during the service prior to Holy Communion. Registration is open for both Nursery and Sunday School using an online form found on the Saint Thomas website under Families/Sunday School.

Growing in Faith. This week at Saint Thomas Church, we have been hosting events focused on an emerging program called, *Diddy Disciples*, which includes training in Storytelling and Leading Worship with young children. During our Sunday School class today at 11 a.m., we welcome the Reverend Dr. Sharon Moughtin-Mumby, Old Testament scholar, author and founder of *Diddy Disciples*, to lead our lesson alongside our Nursery and Sunday School team. All families are welcome to attend. This is particularly suitable for babies, toddlers and young children under the age of eight.

A quiet area is available in the Chantry Chapel for **Children and Families** who wish to worship together. Accompanied young children are welcome to use this space during the 9 and 11 a.m. liturgies, where they are invited to enjoy a range of Bible stories and soft toys.

The Saint Thomas Church 2020 Lenten Outreach Drive is now underway. ADULT CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Theology Class. Today, at 10 a.m., on the fifth floor of the Parish House, Dr. Julie Faith Parker from The General Theological Seminary will begin a four-part series entitled "Quiet Courage." This series will lead us through Lent with a focus on the Old Testament stories featured in each Sunday's lectionary lesson. Today's class will focus on Abraham, the founder of Israel's faith. Subsequent classes will focus on Moses, David, and Ezekiel. The course will pay close attention to the Hebrew text through exegetical and theological discussion.

"Introduction to Anglicanism" Lecture Series. Our 2019-20 Visiting Lecturer, Dr. Christopher Wells, the Executive Director of the Living Church Foundation, will deliver the third and final part of his lecture series on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of next week (March 10, 11, and 12), from 6:30 to 8 p.m. in Andrew Hall. The upcoming lectures are entitled "Whither Anglicanism?" Topics to be covered will include the late 20th century ecumenical transformation of Anglican ecclesiology and, in particular, the work of the Anglican-Roman Catholic International Commission (ARCIC).

Pilgrims' Course 2020 will resume on Tuesday, March 10, from 6:30 p.m. to 8 p.m. with a session entitled, "The History of the Church 1: From House Church to Established Religion". The evening will begin with a simple meal at 6:30 p.m., and the class will run from 7 to 8 p.m. Newcomers to the parish and those wishing to refresh their faith are invited to the course, which is a comprehensive introduction to the Christian faith as received and understood by the Episcopal Church. Lenten Devotional Study.
